



INFORMATION FOR HUNTERS

Thank you for helping feed families in New Mexico! New Mexico Hunters Helping the Hungry (NM-HHH) is a wild game meat donation program. The program is administered by Roadrunner Food Bank in Albuquerque, one of the five food banks working to end hunger throughout the state of New Mexico.

HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

- New Mexico Environment Department-certified processors across the state have enrolled in the program. A full list can be found at rffb.org/hunters.
- Donations will be used to cover processing fees for Hunters not electing to pay the cost directly.
- Processors will grind and package all meat.
- Roadrunner will collect the meat from processors.
- Wild Game meat will be used by food bank partners to feed families through their network of pantries and programs.

HOW TO DONATE

- Locate a participating meat processor at rffb.org/hunters.
- Donate game, including deer, elk, antelope, ibex, oryx, and barbary sheep, per the Food Donors Liability act (41-10-1 NMSA).
- Complete a simple, one-page form stating the meat has been properly cared for in the field and during transport.

Note: Processors have full authority to turn away any animal they believe has not been cared for properly. Donated product will not be sold, transferred or bartered for money, other products or services. Donor is released from any liability based on Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act.

Food Safety Protocol for Wild Game Donation

In order for your harvested game animal to be eligible for donation, you must attest the following carcass care protocol was followed and submit this completed form with your donated carcass. All of the following points must be answered either “yes” or “no”.

One hunger donation form should be completed for each animal donated. Form should be submitted to Roadrunner Food Bank.

		The animal appeared to be healthy and did not exhibit obvious signs of illness.
		The animal was field dressed (eviscerated) within one hour of harvest.
		The meat was chilled or placed in refrigeration at temperatures below 41 degrees Fahrenheit quickly after field dressing.
		The meat was protected from contamination during transport and separated from non-food items.
		During transportation the meat was maintained a temperature below 41 degrees Fahrenheit.
		Hunter elected to pay the NM-HHH processing fee directly to the processor.
